

Peter MacKeith Expedition Climbing Grants

The "Peter MacKeith Memorial Endowment Fund for Climbing" was established in 1981 by the family of Peter MacKeith, late president of the Alaska Alpine Club, in honor of Peter's love for climbing and of his climbing achievements in Alaska, Afghanistan, Greenland, and Iceland. The Alaska Alpine Club was given the responsibility of distributing the earnings from the endowment for the purpose of supporting worthwhile mountaineering ventures by Club members in Alaska or elsewhere in the world.

Requirements for submitting a proposal:

All expedition members must be Alaska Alpine Club members for at least a year prior to receiving the grant.

The proposal must contain the following:

Names, addresses, and resume of climbing experience for each expedition member.

A description of the climbing objective.

A description of how the party plans to carry out the climb and approximate dates of the climb.

A budget for the expedition explaining how a climbing grant will be used.

DEADLINE for submitting a proposal is March 1 of each year.

- Send proposals to AAC, PO Box 81174, College, Alaska 99708 Obligations of the expedition upon receiving a grant:
 - Use the grant money for the original climbing expedition described in 1. the proposal or return the money to the Alaska Alpine Club.

Provide an acknowledgement that the expedition has recieved a Peter

MacKeith Climbing Grant from the Alaska Alpine Club.

Submit an article (with pictures if possible) about the climb for the Club's publication Descent.

Present a slide show about the climb for the Alaska Alpine Club.

These obligations hold even when the objective of the climb is NOTE: not attained.

General:

Grants will be awarded at the March Annual Meeting of the Alaska 1. Alpine Club.

Expeditions are not limited to Alaska or to the United States.

Expeditions are not limited to first ascents or climbs of unusual difficulty although these aspects will be taken into consideration.

The financial need of the expedition's climbers will be given 4. high priority.

In any given year, the Club may distribute the entire earnings of the endowment, part of it, or none of it, depending on the merits of the proposals. Grants may be awarded to one or several expeditions.

Alaska Avalanche School in Danger. The Alaskan Alpine Club (Doug Buchanan) is again protesting the Avalanche Seminar put on by Doug Fessler of the Alaska Avalanche School and sponsored by us. It hardly seems necessary to respond to his lies but some comment seems in order. Doug's complaints (from "And they did it again"): "Without informing the Alaskan Alpine Club or the Alaska Alpine Rescue Group (the primary mountaineering orgnanizations in Fairbanks), or the general public, the Alaska Division of Parks has again granted its political supporters a tax paid and subsidized public relations program based on mountaineering: ("sponsorship" of a tax funded service). "Why weren't all local outdoor organizations informed of the opportunity to "sponsor" this tax funded, state government service so they could benefit from the free publicity?. "Why are our public funds wasted on an expensive local office of the Division of Parks (with all of its employees, including TWO highly paid Director level positions) if Park programs are coordinated though private political supporters? "Sheffield and the Division of Parks run a sleezy government that slips publicly funded favors to its friends. Where lies honesty in government and its supporters? "Perhaps you like Sheffield and the Division of Parks: But if you tolerate this practise, never complain when the Republicrat side of the machine is in power and duplicates this practice to benefit your most disliked political opponents. How can you then complain of dishonest government and maintain your personal integrity? How can you maintain your personal integrity and complain of military contracts slipped to political supporters? "There are always dishonest politicians, bureaucrats and political supporters. "If you want to destroy good public programs and good government, cover-up and support their wrongs, so that the wrongs are rewarded and grow. "If you want to build good public programs and good government, publically denounce ALL government wrongs, and withdraw support from the bureaucrats and organizations that support those wrongs. "The previous lessons of government and society demonstrate that we don't have a choide or workable alternative. ignore history are destined to repeat it. "The Division of Parks and its supporters are not involved 1-5legislators and the Governor by writing letter, sending POMs (free messages you can send from the Legislative Information Office at 5th and Barnette) phone calls or telegrams. A listing of addresses for the Interior delegation and Governor Sheffield is included.

On November 6 a business meeting was held and a resolution in support of the School was passed. A copy of it is included in this Descent and copies were sent to the Fairbanks delegation, Commissioner Wunnicke and the State Parks Advisory Board. The only response so far has been a letter of support from Commissioner Wunnicke and some discussions with one of Bettye Fahrenkamp's aides.

UPDATE!!!

Avalanche School Update January 7, 1986

The entire avalanche program (except for road and railroad danger) has been cut and will cease as of 30 June 1986 unless funding is reinstated by the legislature. Programs eliminated include: avalanche education (the Avalanche School), data collection, State avalanche experts, backcountry snow stability and mountain weather forecasts. Write to the Governor, the local representatives, and these key members of the Legislative Affairs and Finance Committees.

Ask to have the funding reinstated because of (list the reasons you want to have the programs retained) and recommend that funding be transferred from Department of Public Safety to Department of Natural Resources, at the FY 85 level. Some cuts have already been made in the FY 86 budget.

Letters are more effective than Public Opinion Messages and should reach legilator as soon as possible after the Legislature meets on 13 January.

The annual Alaska Alpine Club Ski Mountaineering Course will be given during the spring of 1986. Two sections will be offered:

Introduction to Ski Mountaineering. Jan. 21-March 16. For persons with cross-country skiing and cold weather camping experience. Will teach the basics of camping and ski travel in Alaskan mountains, including introductory crevasse rescue and safety topics.

Intermediate Ski Mountaineering and Climbing. April 8-May 4. For persons having successfully completed the introductory course or with other mountaineering experience.

Tuition for each course is \$20.00. Anyone in the Fairbanks community with the appropriate experience is invited to participate. These courses are a great way to get into the mountains and to meet other mountaineers!

The courses consist of weekly lectures or discussion sessions held TUESDAYS at 7:30 pm in a room to be announced on the UAF campus and weekend trips (early Sat to Sun evening) to areas in the Alaska Range.



AAC Goes To The Fair

The club participated in Sports Day at the Tanana Valley Fair along with golfers, tac won do, scuba divers, skiers, swimmers, hockey, stock car racers, etc. We got the blue ribbon for best sports day booth. (Tac won do got the grand prize for their broken boards and loud grunts.) Ropes were hung from the ceiling and numerous prusiks up and rappels down were made. French and front point crampon techniques were demonstrated by Mike Masters on the artificial snow slope (sheet of plywood leaned on the stage). This was also used to show ice axe arrests. One interesting discovery was that positive clearance ice axes skated just like the books said. Lesson here is file back those points or avoid climbing on AC plywood.

Stan made a 3 foot by 5 foot banner out of ripstop nylon, patterned after the club patch. This will be available for summit pictures, future booths, etc. Stan also made a 2 foot square frame with a sheet of frosted mylar for showing slides on. We had pictures of ice climbing, snow climbing, and igloo building.

Mike took his entire winter pack (minus food and fuel) and set up a nice display of gear. Other participants included Rex Rundquist and Mike Nobel. Several people expressed an interest in joining and were given an introductory sheet with application blank.

Ideas for next year include a rope on the outside of the building to attract more people. The coliseum seems to be in an eddy, catching only a small portion of the flow of fair participants. We could also set up a belay tower for practicing static and dynamic belays.
